Ranga was just one month old, feeble and crying his heart out when we found him...

How your contributions help children like Ranga to become responsible adults in life.

Ranga was just a month-old baby when he was found unattended. Ranga soon found a home at the SOS Children's Village in Galle and his SOS Mother was able to provide the much needed care immediately. At the Galle Village, he grew up in a family-based environment and became a very creative and expressive little boy.

Let me remind you that like Ranga, a large number of children in Sri Lanka live without the support of one or both parents. Thousands of children suffer from neglect, abuse, exploitation or complete deprivation as a result of poverty.

Many children like Ranga are separated from their natural parents and local communities owing to a variety of reasons. Loss of parents through death or illness, migration of parents to find paid employment, dysfunctional family relations, war-related separations, poverty, drug / alcohol addiction have led to many child violations where rights children are separated from their biological parents temporarily permanently. Children born or to unwedded mothers are often stigmatised, which in turn, compels the mothers to abandon them.



It is within a family that children secure their emotional and physical well-being, ability to spend their childhood to the full and prepare for a future where their potential is realised.

- There are over 5000 children without parental care in the Northern Province of our country.
- 1 in 7 children of all Sri Lankan children without parental care do not have access to education.
- More than 10 complaints of child abuse are reported daily in Sri Lanka, making child abuse a top criminal offence.

At SOS Children's Villages, we make sure every child belongs to a caring family, is protected and enjoys a sense of belonging. Here, children learn values, share responsibilities and form life-long relationships. "family environment" gives them a solid foundation on which they could build their lives. Through love and acceptance, emotional wounds are healed confidence is built. Children learn to trust and believe in themselves others. With self-assurance, each child can recognize and fulfill his or her full potential.

SOS Children's Villages perceive Based its Family Care Programme and Family Strengthening Programme as two complimentary interventions. The organisation strongly believes that every effort must be made to assure that children remain in their biological families and that those children for whom this is not possible have an equal right to grow up in a caring family environment.

SOS Children's Village families strengthen the bond between children in care who live together as brothers and sisters, and a stable well trained care giver - the "SOS Mother". Every family member takes a unique position within the independent SOS Family.

SOS Children's Villages ensures, with support from friends like you, that natural brothers and sisters are kept together within one family. SOS Children's Villages clearly differentiates between the role of the organisation, whose role is to provide support to the SOS families and that of the SOS family, who assumes the caregiving role.

Every child has the right to grow up in a caring family environment, yet so often, this is left unfulfilled for large number of children in Sri Lanka. With the recognition of significant gaps in the implementation of all aspects of children's rights, a range of alternative care options have been identified and recommended. Nevertheless, these options should be implemented according to the specific needs and in the best interests of the child.

The loss or separation from the family has a primary impact on a child, leaving the child particularly vulnerable when left without the nurturing care of a protective, supportive and caring family environment. The health, overall development and well-being of the child are at risk, particularly if the loss occurs in the critical periods of a child's growth, including early childhood. Based on the assurance that the biological family is the best place for a child to live, out-of-home child care options must respect the role of the biological family and seek only to complement biological family and local community when these are unable to accomplish their responsibilities. The SOS family childcare model is put into practice around the world in many countries with different social and economic realities. This model is proved to be a better response (amongst the out-of-home childcare options) for the children who have been left alone in this world.

It is an opportunity I would like to extend to all Sri Lankans. After all, making a positive change in one child's life is equal to making a positive change in the community at large for years to come.

By partnering with SOS, I was able to build a young life and to give needy children chance to grow in a family. It is an opportunity that should not be missed. To be part of a child's life until he or she becomes an independent young adult with skills and character, is to contribute meaningfully to the society. It is an honour for which SOS expects very little from a donor.

My wish for SOS Children's Villages is that it receives support of many more kind hearted donors, so that more children without care are able to flourish in a family environment!

I think it was 1982, and I was 4 years old when I was brought to a place with lots of trees and houses. I met my SOS mother Thilaka and my many sisters and bothers to be. I lived here, the Piliyandala SOS Children's Village with my SOS family for over 18 years. Now I am an adult and many often ask me what it was like growing up in an SOS Village. but I have no special answers. This is because it was very much like a normal family, full of love and support. Of course I had my favourite siblings, Sandun, Latha, Sriyani and Chandra. I had my own chores around the house and my elder sisters supervised me. Having many siblings was a blessing. We shared a lot of moments, both happy and sad. We used to study together. I feel very lucky when I look back.

If I speak about my mother, I have to admit she pretty much did everything around the house.

My mother was an amazing person, I remember she never left our bedsides if any of us was to fall ill. She was my guiding star and made me who I am today.

She gave me my foundation and helped me realise that I can reach whatever goal I wish to take up!

Today, I'm a supervisor working at a beauty salon. I always loved the industry and decided to start from scratch - from sweeping the shop floor to making tea, to where I am now! I did my best to learn from my mentors and won the confidence of many clients who are loyal to me today.

Even though the older SOS children are independent, the strength of the network is present. I'm forever thankful for this experience. I feel immensely lucky; there are so many children left in hospitals or worse... but I had the fortune of coming to an SOS Village. I feel we need to tell Sri Lankan society that a child from SOS Children's Villages is as lucky or even more so!

Remembering Mother Thilaka

SOS Thilaka joined Children's Villages Piliyandala and took care of over 20 children during her tenure as an SOS Mother. She suffered from arthritis later on in her life and requested an early retirement. What is remarkable about her story is that her SOS children who had left the village after marraige or were in employement, rallied around their ailing SOS Mother. The family rented a house and cared for their mother using a roster to make sure at least one family member was to be always present.

Mother Thilaka passed away during June 2009. We pray she attains Nirvana for her great service to SOS Children's Villages and the many SOS children she raised throughout the years.

SOS Temporary Care Project in Jaffna

Shanthi, 14, is a beautiful girl from a village called Kanagaraimkulam in the Vavuniya district. She now lives at the SOS Temporary Care Project where 81 such unaccompanied children like her who were once at risk live in safety and shelter.

Nearly 200 children and youth were provided care at the SOS Temporary Care Project. As of now, we have been able to reunite 120 of them with their biological families/extended families.

Shanthi lost her parents during the war. Yet she has come a long way from being afraid and alone, to a child taking lead in playing games, laughing, learning and trying to enjoy a normal life.

SOS Children's Villages Sri Lanka hopes to establish the sixth SOS Children's Village in Jaffna. In this Village, the children from the SOS Temporary Care Project will obtain the best family based care untill they grow up to be responsible young adults. My name is Surangi and I am proud to say that I was and am a child of an SOS Children's Village in Sri Lanka. School life was different from life at home. I got to meet various children from different backgrounds. So I obtained a huge amount of experience in associating with all of them. I still recall my best friend Marina who taught me to speak in English. We had lots of fun. Those memories will never fade away and I am still in touch with her!

I got through the G.C.E. (O/L) examination and thereafter a scholarship was awarded to me to follow a three month English course at the Cambridge Academy of English in England. I could not possibly believe my luck! This was another turning point in my life. I enjoyed the time abroad very much.

Later, back in Sri Lanka I completed my G.C.E (A/L) examination in the Commerce stream. After studies I was employed at the Hilton Hotel in Colombo for some time.

When I was 21 years old, I got married. Today I have two lovely daughters, a loving husband, and a house of my own too.

Guess what? My SOS Mother is retired from her role at SOS and is now living and is cared for by me! A huge "Thank You" is not enough for my beloved mother who was behind me like a shadow. The UN Year of the Child 1979 provided an impetus for policy change. The then Sri Lankan government took the bold step to move away from institutionalisation of orphaned children to the novel concept of children growing up in a Village with a mother. I was therefore privileged to be associated with the setting up of the first SOS Children's Village at Piliyandala in 1979 and thereafter seeing four other SOS Children's Villages established, providing a wonderful setting for a large number of children to grow-up in a safe and secure environment.

The story of Wasanthi reflects the outcome of this novel initiative. Many like Wasanthi have found tender loving care from women who have admirably played the role of SOS Mothers. At least three generations have passed through the SOS Children's Villages and we are now grandmothers to a number of little ones enjoying the warmth of a family.

During times of rapid socio-economic change a large number of young children remain "at risk" of neglect and abuse. The data and information presented daily in the media is alarming. We at SOS Children's Villages continue to express concern on such matters and have offered positive and remedial actions as in the case of the children displaced on account of thirty years of civil unrest.

Though supported by foreign donors, the SOS Children's Villages Sri Lanka remain a national venture, administered by Sri Lankan staff and children nurtured according to Sri Lankan values.

My collegues and I record with pride the ever increasing number of local sponsors who generously contribute to the progress of the children at SOS Children's Villages.

Our priority remains to enable every child to live with love, protection and security in a loving home, to have the right to education and a happy childhood which will no doubt contribute to responsible adulthood.
